Preparing for finals starts with planning ahead and staying organized.


- 1. Know when your finals are scheduled.
 This can be found in your syllabus or by searching "TAMUG final exam schedule."
- 2. Create a study schedule that breaks material into manageable sections.
- 3. Use active study strategies, attend tutoring sessions, and go to office hours to clarify questions and strengthen understanding.
- 4. Prioritize rest by maintaining consistent sleep, staying hydrated, and taking short breaks to prevent burnout.

First-Gen Spotlight: Jason Gonzalez

My name is Jason Gonzalez, and I am a dedicated Marine Biology student at Texas A&M University at Galveston, passionate about ocean science, education, and research. I am interested in elasmobranchs, striving to deepen my understanding of their biology and anatomy while exploring innovative strategies to support shark conservation and population recovery.

Currently, I serve as a Community Leader, supporting residential life by mentoring students and providing after-hours assistance to ensure a safe and welcoming campus environment.

Academically, I serve as an undergraduate volunteer in Dr. Wells' Shark Ecology and Fisheries Science Lab, working under the guidance of graduate student Taryn Hood. Our research focuses on age and growth analysis of Atlantic stingrays through vertebral examination. I am also a second-year member of the eNGAGE Gulf Scholars Program, where I am developing a research poster that explores the human impacts on blacktip shark size and abundance, combining ecological data with conservation insights.





Where it all started

My professional journey began at the Jack K. Williams Library, where I served as a front desk assistant, supporting students and staff with resource access. In the summer of 2025, I joined Texas A&M Sea Camp as an instructor, teaching marine biology to young learners through hands-on activities, dissections, and field trips that fostered curiosity and environmental awareness.
