
Battalion Feud

End of Spring Operations

- The Sea Aggie Former Student Network held its sixth annual Golf Tournament to raise funds to support students and cadet of the Galveston campus. Cadet Jacob Daniels volunteered on this event as a cadet of the CORPS of Cadets.
- On April 26, the CORPS of Cadets held two annual events. During the morning, they held the Change of Command ceremony, where the outgoing cadet leadership transfer command of the CORPS to the incoming cadet leadership, and the CORPS salute Senior cadets that are close to completing their membership with the COPRS. Then, in the afternoon, the CORPS of Cadets held its award ceremony. Some 61 scholarships or awards from external donors or organizations were handed, and 18 received the Commandant's Award and 4 cadets received the Superintendent's Distinguished Cadet award.

- April 27 Following the Chain of Command, to prepare the new cadet leadership for their new roles, the CORPS held it retreat and training day.
- April 28 the CORPS of Cadets ended it normal operations, so cadets can focus on their finals for this semester and prepare for summer sea term onboard the TS Kennedy or onboard their selected commercial vessel.

Employer Engagement

- The Stolt Tanker Mentorship program has officially wrapped up for the year. High remarks were made by all involved. We are beginning the recruitment process for the next set of mentees and will have 4 spots for the 25-26 academic year.
- APL has reached out to all maritime academies to develop an MOU to explore ways to support their recruitment needs and the needs of our cadets through possible scholarships, cadet shipping opportunities, sponsorships, etc.





Aquatics

- Attended NIRSA conference in Orlando.
- Solenoid valve was replaced as well as a fuse on the Acid- Rite system.
- Dive ended classes.
- We had the Lifeboat safety class at the pool doing drills this month.
- NOAA visited the pool for a Dive test out with their crew.
- Summer and Fall scheduling secured with lifeguards.
- Added a frog saving device to the pool to help with frog safety, we have saved one frog so far!
- Celebrated our staff with an end of the year dinner at Koops.

Fitness

- Small Group Training is wrapping up for the semester. We are exploring being able to host some fitness classes in the summer.
- We are building relationships with new yoga instructors and should be able to have a full group fitness schedule for the fall semester.
- At the NIRSA conference and Expo we demoed lots options for new exercise equipment for our facilities improvement project. Joe has requested quotes for various pieces, and we will have the first phase of renovations complete for the Fall 2025 semester.



Facilities

- We completed the hiring process for staffing in the Summer 2025 and Fall 2025 semesters. I interviewed 24 students and of that group, hired 8.
- Adriane Colon, Patrick Cizeck and Camryn Boyd have been promoted from Facilities Customer Service Assistants to Building Managers, effective August 2025.
- All outgoing and incoming building managers met for an informal training on Monday, 4/28.
- The facility hours will transition to intercession hours (M-F 12:00-6:00pm) on Wednesday, 5/7. Summer hours will begin on Tuesday, 5/27.

Green Dot

- The Green Dot team participated in Spring Fest this year. We hosted a booth where students were able to do a "pickle taste test". 41 students participated in this blind pickle tasting. Additionally, we gave out custom Green Dot Koozies, free Green snow cones and encouraged members of student organizations to register for a Green Dot Overview.
- NLOC and SOUL were selected to win a \$250 cash prize from Green Dot at Leadership Banquet.
- 2 Green Dot overviews were given at the Student Affairs student worker training on Saturday, 4/12.
 Roughly 20 student leaders were trained.



Peer Education

- Peer Educators hosted a successful Earth Day event on April 25th. Students were able to decorate a terracotta pot and plant a seedling.
- Peer Educators hosted De-stress Fest on April 30th. We provided water and Gatorade to students, allowed students to build their own study bags, hosted free ear acupuncture, and gave students an opportunity to relax outside.
- Mckenzie Bancroft will be graduating, leaving a vacancy in the role. We need to hire a new peer educator to start in the Fall 2025 semester.
- Peer Educators set up a Denim Day Display at the Pool to show support to survivors of sexual assault.

Wellness

- The American Foundation for Suicide Prevention and Gulf Coast Center came to campus to provide a Talk Saves Lives Train the Trainer. We had 16 professional staff members go through this intensive training so they will be prepared to give Talk Saves Lives presentations on campus.
- The JED Early intervention team is continuing to meet regularly. We have tentative plans to spend the summer working on a social norming campaign and providing information to parents about substance misuse and help seeking behaviors.
- We have had long discussions about the distribution of long time resource "Campus Well". We are working diligently with Campus Well staff and TAMU officials to ensure the continued adherence of state policies and distribution of wellness content to students.










Midnight Breakfast




Event Coordinating


DANNY R
